How we teach British Values

These values are taught explicitly through RE, Forest Schools and PSHE but consistently reinforced in all areas of our very broad and balanced curriculum.

Democracy:

Each class decides its own class rules, rewards and sanctions

We have a School Council and Sports Council who meet regularly to discuss issues raised by class councils and discuss ways to improve the school. Every member is voted for by their class

Children have an annual questionnaire where they are able to put forward their views about the school

Rule of Law:

The importance of laws, whether they are those that govern the class, the school or the country are consistently reinforced at Lea Primary

Pupils are taught from an early age the rules of the school. These are classroom rules, playground rules and safety rules. They are taught the value and reasons behind these rules and laws and that they govern and protect us. They are taught the responsibility that this involves and the consequences when rules are broken. Visits from authorities such as police and fire reinforce these messages.

Individual Liberty:

At Lea Primary, pupils are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe, supportive environment. As a school we educate and provide boundaries for young people to make informed choices. Simple choices such as extra curricular activities are always applied as is a predominantly child led curriculum. Pupils are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedom and advised how to exercise these safely, for example through e-safety, safety assemblies, PSHE lessons and Forest Schools. They also learn how famous people of the past have used their freedom and rights in our assemblies based on influential people in history

Mutual Respect:

Mutual respect is at the heart of our values. Children learn that their behaviours have an effect on their own rights and those of others. All members of the school community treat each other with respect.

Tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs

At Lea Primary, we actively promote diversity through our celebrations of different faiths and cultures in our curriculum and assemblies. We learn songs, listen to music and debate current affairs from around the world and have links with an inner city school. We use displays to promote knowledge and appreciation of other faiths and beliefs. We also have multi cultural theme days built into our annual planner where we often invite guests.
